COMPTON HEIGHTS BAND

A particularly sparkling jewel in the crown of neighborhoods surrounding Tower Grove Park is the Compton Heights Concert Band. Shepherded affectionately by its President and Executive Director, Harry F. Swanger, the Band is a reflection of many characteristics that make this area great - diversity, vitality and a respect for history and tradition.

The Band is diverse. A volunteer collection of primarily amateur artists, it has grown to better than seventy members. Many are high school or college students, but there are musicians like Mr. Swanger, who has played the bassoon for some forty years. Like their audiences the Band members come from all walks of life and all parts of the St. Louis Metropolitan area.

The twinkle in the eye of Mr. Swanger and the enthusiasm with which the orchestra delivers each program conveys their vibrant vitality. My exposure to the Band has been at their Musical Monday performances. They are presented on eight successive mid-summer weeks in Tower Grove Park and are encore performances of each preceding Sunday at Francis Park.

Considering their Holiday Spectacular at Powell Symphony Hall each December featuring thirty vintage herald trumpeters, the Band performs more than 150 different songs annually. This impressive repertoire is the product of over thirty years of hard work and good fortune.

Leaving his native Pennsylvania in 1975 with a law degree and a vision of practicing public interest law involving juveniles, Mr. Swanger bought a home in Compton Heights. Shortly thereafter while attending the annual neighborhood Easter Parade along Longfellow Avenue, he was surprised to see the only music provided was by a neighbor broadcasting an audiotape through two speakers mounted on the back of a pick-up truck. His love of live music and abhorrence of ticky-tack in a refined setting caused him to seek out like minded music makers.

The first rehearsal occurred in Mr. Swanger's living room. The eight people who attended formed the nucleus of an organization that preserves a unique American art form - the American Concert Band created by Patrick Gilmore in the mid 1800's and perfected by John Philip Souza at the


dawn of the industrial age. The American Concert Band concept guarantees each program will have something for everyone. Last year alone, in addition to rousing Souza marches, the Band welcome a trio of trumpeters, the University of Missouri Steel Drum Band, Mariachi Los Compadres, a classical soprano prodigy and the incomparable tenor, Hugh Smith.

CHEAP TRX

THE DEPARTMENT STORE FOR THE ALTERNATIVE LIFESTYLE

It was seventeen years ago when proprietors Frank Neal and Michael Mahler had a kind of mind expanding/life altering revelation while visiting friends in Chicago. They happened upon a re-sale shop specializing in painted furniture and faux painting. "We can do that", they thought independently, and then out loud, simultaneously. "Only better", added Frank (also out loud). The idea to bring the concept back to St. Louis hit them both like a drag queen, on stage, with a broken heel. And it hit hard (as you can imagine it would).

Frank and Michael were both looking for a change to their working lives. The aggravation and stress of working for someone else was at an all-time high so the idea was ripe with sincerity and conviction, fueled by their combined creative talents and desire to do something new. Something, they could do better – we're reminded. And so Cheap TRX was born.

Which brings us to the meaning behind the name Cheap TRX. It's actually what they call the technique applied to the cast-off furniture collected from flea markets, garage sales, alleys, etc. to give it that renewed, fresh and custom look. So there you are.

Their first store was on Cherokee Street in Antique Row. A likely location to set-up shop selling restored furniture. They also featured 1920's & 30's collectibles which, they discovered, they had been collecting uncontrollably and unabated for years. It would make an excellent item to sell along with furniture (said Michael, out loud).

Their quirky & fun collection of inventory set them apart from the traditionally stoic Antique Row merchants which brought them more interest and eventually media attention. This lead to requests for custom work

on customer-owned pieces. Local artists made inquiries and soon they were selling their work on consignment. They also expanded into jewelry and created a gallery space for local photography and paintings. Gradually, they out-grew their Cherokee Street space and in July, 1992 found their current location in the South Grand area which was then only beginning its re-birth.

Bringing their unusual products to a bigger space with greater visibility opened the doors to a new group of curious customers and brought more attention to the neighborhood revitalization. With an already loyal customer base and the promise of a wider, more diverse group of

REHABBING WITH RICH

A PRIME NEIGHBORHOOD IN SUB PRIME TIMES

Instead of doing a rehab article about a specific property, I'd like to examine how our Tower Grove Heights is holding up in this sub prime world of foreclosures and property losses. Very well, I think. After reading this, I bet you'll agree.

Taking inventory of our fourteen square blocks, I came up with 690 total buildings. But then something weird popped up. We used to have 341 two family flats but now only have 240. What happened to the missing 101 two families? All converted to singles. Same thing with the 4-family flats. We used to have 29 but five were converted to townhouses so 111 living units in TGHT's have been eliminated, much of it due to the recent housing boom that grew from low interest rates.

Losing housing units may not sound like a good idea but reducing density has several benefits, parking being the most

obvious. Even better than that, rental buildings have become owner occupied buildings and that's a good thing. Owners are more likely to take an interest in the heartbeat of a neighborhood when their home and equity are on the line.

National headlines about the sub prime mess have shown neighborhoods with 30% of their homes for sale. By contrast, I only saw 18 for sale signs (none mentioning 'foreclosure') in TGHT's representing only 2.6% of our property. I'm sure we have more than 18 properties for sale but our area is very healthy by comparison.

each day. Tim even had one long-term assignment in Minneapolis and everyone was able to move with him for a few months.

When they decided to buy a house they looked in Tower Grove Heights. Anita already knew she liked Tower Grove Park. They found their current house ...well built, sound, in their price range AND it had a copy of the Tower Grove Heights Gazette in the bathroom. If you have been in the neighborhood for awhile, you would remember the former owner, the O'Tooles, who had owned the Blackthorn.

In 1993, Tim with a partner started a firm, Paradigm Architects. Some of his early projects were with Tower Grove Homes and Susie Guthermuth who he continues to work with today. Other clients include First Bank with projects in Missouri and California. He is also doing work in Hermann, Missouri with James Dierberg, including an artisan cheese factory and a microbrewery.

When Anita decided to go back to work, she approached the International Institute. The first

year was stressful. Tim and she played tag team as she raced off to teach night classes. She decided to quit and then was hired for a 3 year grant program for a family literacy program for immigrants. For the next few years, she “grant hopped” working on programs as grants were funded. Many aspects of the grants continue today such as introducing new families to the amenities in the St Louis area.

In 2000, Anita became the Director of Educational Services helping 2500 students a year. When Anita first started at the Institute 16 years ago, half the students in her English class were Polish, the other half Vietnamese. Then Bosnians began arriving, eventually peaking at the rate of 100 – 120 refugees per month during the late 1990’s. In the last several years the Institute has resettled fewer, but more diverse, groups of refugees who represent a wide variety of nations. Last year, the Institute provided services to new Americans representing over 100 ethnicities. The International Institute sponsors the yearly International Festival in Tower Grove Park—a good opportunity to see the many nationalities, which Anita says gives a flavor of the diversity of the Institute.

Anita and Tim said that they have loved living in Tower Grove Height and raising their four children here -- Laura, 21, a senior at Fordham University, Paul, 20, also at Fordham and currently doing a year abroad at Oxford, England. Christopher is 18 and a freshman at Truman State; Stephanie a freshman at St. Elizabeth’s Academy. They all enjoy the restaurants, international stores, the Gardens and the park. You might have seen Christopher’s sign last spring looking for pet walking jobs—“Who better than a Barker to be a Walker”

And yes, their house is renovated beautifully. The wall between the dining room and kitchen is removed leaving a space for a granite topped island and the third floor has an added bathroom. Tim and Anita say the next project will be an addition with a family room off the back overlooking an urban garden.

What goes around comes around. Anita used to write resident profiles in the Gazette and I’m twisting her arm to write an article on the biking trail to the Chain of Rocks Bridge which they love. Don’t we have interesting people who live in our neighborhood?


The concerts are free and open to the public. Seating is available, but many relax on lawn chairs or blankets.

Office YOGA Part III

REHABBING WITH RICH

A PRIME *continued* NEIGHBORHOOD IN SUB PRIME TIMES

While doing this article, I realized TGHT's is strangely unique in several ways. First, we have no in-fill housing. In-fill housing results from building new, usually ill-fitting units to replace properties that were torn or burned down. Also, we have no single story buildings in all of Tower Grove Heights. As magnificent as Compton Heights is, it can't claim either of the above.

The other weird thing is that 58% of our living units are rental and that's dangerously close to what's considered a tipping point of 60%, making it difficult to attract buyers. How come we're not tipping? I can explain this with my reaction to seeing Susie Gudermuth's 3834 Utah Place for the first time. It had five built-ins (China cabinets, butler's pantries, etc.), colonnades, spectacular woodwork, two bathrooms and over 1200 square feet. I thought "This is an apartment?" That's the secret---many of our rental units are more magnificent than our homes. Often, tenants live more luxuriously than their landlords. As a result, we have excellent tenants who want to live here, often becoming owners and staying in the Heights.

Then there's luck. Have you noticed that our original design is being copied in the new 'towns' being built in St. Charles? The convenience of the walking neighborhood we've enjoyed for 100 years is back. We also don't see our homes being leveled for mega mansions and won't see an airport, highway or Wal-Mart impact us any time soon.

TGHT's has faired very well during these uncertain times and even benefited a bit through the single unit conversions. As far as still being the place to move to, one of my tenants told me (after negotiating my lease, of course) that he would 'live in this neighborhood in a cardboard box'. What sub prime mess? †


