- **Safety Committee** - Ryan Barry (safety@towergroveheights.com) and Barbara Gilchrist

- Many thanks to everyone who attended, donated to or volunteered to help with the Safety Committee's well-attended "Pizza for Cameras" fundraiser on November 4 which raised approximately \$6700.

- Final selection of type of camera has been made by the safety committee and they will be presenting to the board for approval at the February meeting. Once finalized by the board, homeowners who showed interest in having cameras installed on their property will be contacted. If you are interested in participating, please contact the safety committee at the email address above.

- STLPD is interested in incorporating a more affordable surveillance camera in neighborhoods thanks to the research done by the committee.

- Tower Grove Heights NOM (Neighborhood Ownership Model) which is a program established by the circuit attorney's office to help stabilize neighborhoods, track crime, and support victims. They co-sponsored an event with Shaw NOM and Tower Grove East NOM called CeaseFire with Lewis Reed. CeaseFire is a program used in other large cities to reduce violent crime.

- Regarding vacant property at 3619 Humphrey, Barbara gave update on progress. TGHNA is pursuing legal action with help from Peter Hoffman against the current homeowner for neglect. Currently owner has 30 days to show "good faith" to address multiple code violations against the nuisance property. The case is in property/municipal court with due to its status of condemned and the multiple code violations.

- **Speakers to discuss Insights and Perspectives on Homelessness: Laurie Phillips, CEO St. Patricks Center and Rachel Witt, Executive Director of South Grand Community Improvement District** (www.stpatrickcenter.org) (www.southgrand.org)
 - St. Patricks Center works with the Housing First methodology by using coordinated entry, rapid rehousing, permanent supportive housing and client engagement. They provide housing services and development, mental/physical/behavioral health services, and workforce training and placement.
 - 1000 transitionally homeless in the St. Louis area with 100 being chronically homeless.
 - South Grand has seen an increase in homeless population in 2018.
 - South Grand Business district is sponsoring a training seminar on January 28 regarding management and interaction with homeless population.
 - Audience voiced concern regarding panhandlers. Rachel suggested calling 911 if it is aggressive in nature as that can lead to neighborhood order of protection.

➔ AGENCY WIDE

We provided rental assistance and case management services to **2,177** clients and their family members.

- Of these clients and their family members, **599** were NEW housing placements.
- **26%** of these clients were veterans.



ABOUT OUR POPULATION

- **61%** men/**39%** women
- **18%** veterans
- **10%** people who are chronically homeless
- Nearly **20%** of our clients self-reported a behavioral health issue; **15%** reported a substance use issue; and **13%** reported a chronic health issue.

HOUSING FIRST

➡ COORDINATED ENTRY

St. Patrick Center is the lead agency for Coordinated Entry, a multi-agency effort under Housing First. St. Patrick Center and Biddle Housing Opportunities Center are Front Doors - centralized locations where people can go for intakes, assessments, meals, shelter and housing coordination.

We completed 3,430 intakes and assessments.

- Of these clients, **64%** were referred to St. Patrick Center and **36%** were referred to other agencies.
- Of the clients referred to us, **60%** followed up with services from a St. Patrick Center program.
- We prevented homelessness for **103** clients, at an average cost of \$211. **What did they need?** Housing deposit, Greyhound bus ticket home, rental assistance, utility assistance and short-term hotel stay.
- **178,000+** hot meals 
- **36,000** emergency shelter nights 



Based on data, about **13%** of the people who walk through our doors need minimal assistance to get back on their feet and stabilized in housing.

68% of our clients are candidates for Rapid Rehousing.

19% qualify for Permanent Supportive Housing, with longer-term, more intensive case management and support.





HOUSING FIRST

➡ RAPID REHOUSING

Rapid Rehousing is an intervention that rapidly connects individuals and families to permanent housing. It includes targeted support services, such as case management, housing identification, rent and move-in assistance, and behavioral health services.



We provided rental assistance and case management services to 961 clients and their family members.

- Of these, **487** were NEW housing placements. 
- **60%** increased their incomes. 

➡ PERMANENT SUPPORTIVE HOUSING

Permanent Supportive Housing is an intervention that combines non-time-limited affordable housing assistance with wrap-around support services. The primary goals are to move people who are chronically homeless into housing, help them maintain that housing and assist them with building their own support systems in the community.

We provided rental assistance and case management services to 1,216 clients and their family members.

- Of these, **112** were NEW housing placements. 
- **59%** increased their incomes. 

HOUSING FIRST

➡ CLIENT ENGAGEMENT

Housing First does not mean housing only. Support services are necessary for Housing First to succeed. They help people get stable and lead productive lives. As part of the St. Louis collaborative effort, St. Patrick Center provides a comprehensive approach, offering support services that we do well and referring clients to other agencies and their areas of expertise.

We helped **295** clients find jobs.

- These jobs increased economic stability for **414** people, including family members.



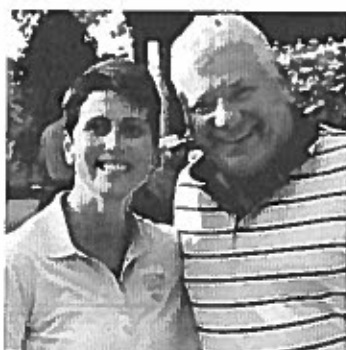
- We helped **371** clients find medical homes by providing healthcare referrals and on-site nursing visits through our partnership with Affinia Healthcare.



- **1,237** clients actively worked on reducing their substance use by attending recovery group meetings.



- We provided **10,000** referrals to connect our clients with support services provided by other agencies.

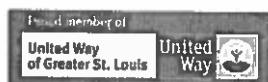

I need help. What do I do?

If you or someone you know is homeless or at risk, here is what to do:

- If it is an emergency, call **9-1-1**.
- If you are homeless, call the **Housing Helpline** at **(314) 802-5444**.
- If you are at risk of becoming homeless, call the **United Way** at **2-1-1** or **1-800-427-4626**.
- If you are homeless or at risk, go to the **St. Patrick Center Welcome Center** (side entrance) at 800 N. Tucker Blvd. to meet with a specialist. All intakes and assessments are conducted at St. Patrick Center. No appointment is necessary.
 - Morning discovery sessions begin at 8am.
 - Afternoon discovery sessions begin at 1pm.
 - Weekend discovery sessions begin at 9:30am.
 - St. Patrick Center serves lunch to the community at noon, seven days a week.

What is Coordinated Entry?

Coordinated Entry is an easy way for people experiencing homelessness to access services.

- It's a multi-agency effort, with many service providers working together.
- It includes meals, shelter, assessment, homelessness prevention and housing coordination.
- The end goal is placement into housing!
