



# Rehabbing With Rich: Cinderella Story

About 25 years ago I was working late on our Hartford house when I noticed an unusual glow coming from across the street. Looking out a front window, I saw what I thought was the Linebach house (our houses still have names) engulfed in fire. However, the house across the street only framed the conflagration streaming from the rear of 3815 Juniata. The burning residence spiraled down from there until Dave Kenyon and his Habitata Company recently purchased the property.

When I went to 3815 Juniata to meet Dave, I actually backed down the front steps to look at the house again. Could this be the house that had been painted blue years ago, then dirty yellow after the fire? I was even more confused when I peeked inside to see the gracefully curving second floor oak railing and balusters crowning an original golden oak paneled staircase. This couldn't be the same house, could it?

Dave Kenyon is anything but a typical rehabber. After sitting in an office for 20 years, he wanted to take a break from being a lawyer. Dave's lawyer friends thought he was a bit blue-collar to be a white-collar worker. and his wife observed that he never complained when he had a hammer in his hands, so rehab was a good match. Refreshingly enthusiastic, Dave is all about breathing life into old houses. He rehabbed a duplex and his own home in the Parkview area near Washington University before ramping up to the enormity of the Juniata project. He told me 3815 Juniata attracted him because, "that's the kind of house we do." Long-time residents say the property was a crack house, brothel (!), and even housed someone currently in prison for murder. But you'd never know that now.

Dave enjoys changing the future of these old houses, but he also respects their past. I loved that he retained the original hot water radiators and put so much effort into the new oak front door, main staircase and period light fixtures.

The house is large and sits on an unusually wide lot, but I felt most of the surprises were on the third floor. The front portion of this level is large and well laid out, but the back section seems to go on forever. There's an enormous open area that features a full bathroom with a Jacuzzi, walk-in closet, and sparkling replacement windows. The entire space has eight-foot ceilings, sans the knee walls that curse most of

our third floors. I liked Dave's idea of using this entire 1000 sq. ft. area as a master bedroom suite.

Sure, the house looks nice now, but we weren't around when the rear sleeping porch collapsed during removal, the third floor roof rafters were discovered to be only 3/4" thick from the fire or the foundation needed



support piers. Dave laughs about missing his deadline (it was last year some time) and coming in under budget, but seems to enjoy the give and take of running the project. He's looking forward to holding the house open for the neighbors in a few weeks, and I'm sure with a hammer in his hand and a house full of adoring friends, Dave will be a happy man.







South Grand Community Improvement District and Jennifer Florida, 15th Ward Alderwoman, requested to pilot a meter program from the Treasurer's office. The meter devices will be implemented on South Grand from November 1st to February 28th. After a month of implementation

a survey will be distributed to the businesses for customers to comment on the meters. The devices have the capability to accept Master Card or Visa credit cards and debit cards, as well as coins. The minimum charge for credit or debit cards is \$1 for the maximum of two hours.

The parking meters' hours have not changed. The devices will operate from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. Monday through Friday and 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturdays. The rate is the same, 50 cents an hour, with a maximum of two hours.

# The Power of Breath


Yoga is not just stretching and chanting. A large part of a yoga practice is learning to breath. While many of us take our breath for granted, breath work is a powerful tool.

A breath practice is called Pranayama which translates to: The power behind and within the breath. It is the releasing and channeling of the body's internal energy which is meant to nurture the level of bodily health and mental clarity. There are several techniques associated with this work. Each is designed to control the breath and open the mind.

One common practice is Ujjayi pranayama or "the victorious breath." This breath is done by narrowing the throat using the piece of cartilage at the top of your voice box called the epiglottis. In doing so, the breath makes an ocean sound. As you listen to the sound, you can smooth out the inhalations and the exhalations. This practice is done on its own as meditation, or throughout the yoga practice with the asanas.

Kapalabhati is a cleansing breath designed to clear the sinuses and energy channels. It enriches the bloodstream, improves circulation, and strengthens digestion. During this exercise, the inhalation and exhalation take place very quickly through the nose. In fact, the exhalation happens as a result of many quick and vigorous contractions of the abdomen. Repeating this breath for 30-40 times will create mind control, cleanse the aura, and add relief of asthma, allergies and sinus symptoms.

Another common breath practice is opposite nostril breathing (Nadi Sodhana). This breath works to balance the energies on both sides of the body. It is done by closing off one nostril, and taking a full inhalation through the other, then closing



the other nostril and exhaling through the opposite side. Not only does this practice aid in digestion and enrich the blood flow, but it balances and calms the mind.

These are just a few of many Pranayama exercises. All of the techniques provide immediate and direct benefits, and, long term, offer steadiness, depth and patience. Finding a comfortable position to start and keeping faith that the breath will become steady is all you need to begin a pranayama practice. Take a moment to experiment with the breath and calm your body and mind. Peace!
