## Tower Grove Heights by Candlelight

On Wednesday, July 19, 2006, powerful winds put TGH and St. Louis in the dark. The 'gust front' delayed the Cardinal baseball game, snapped thousands of tree limbs, and pulled the plug on our power for days. We all went to bed that Wednesday night wishing for electricity, and thinking everything would look better in the morning.

It didn't. Streets and alleys were blocked from tree branches, and Tower Grove Park looked like it went through a blender. There was an earthy scent to the park, and you could smell the pith of pin oak and sweet gum trees that had been ripped apart.

By Thursday morning, most of the electrically cooled air had drained from our houses. Oak staircase railings

became sticky, and sugar got lumpy. Sleeping in our houses was unthinkable, but calling hotels produced a two-step flow chart. If the answer to "Do you have power?" was "yes", then the "Do you have rooms?" answer was always "no."



Carol and Brian of the 3700 block of Arsenal stayed put with Carol extolling the benefits of the extra insulation they had installed recently. Carol claims the house "never got over 82 degrees," and they survived by dragging mattresses down to the first floor.

Bernadette, from the 3800 block of Humphrey, went without power for over a week but was offered electricity Saturday from her neighbor Bob Koehr when he ran an extension cord from his building to hers. Bernadette felt "it was pretty much a lifeline," enabling her to stay in the apartment.

Hartford Coffee Company never lost power, and was one of the neighborhood bright spots. Clarissa, from Hartford Coffee, said, "It was stressful, but we all worked together like family." Instead of the usual staff of three, six people were working, including the owners. The air-conditioned upstairs area, known as the "child free java lounge," was also offered as a cool space. When I asked about outage stories, Clarissa smiled, then quickly glanced away. It took a bit of verbal arm-twisting to get her to tell me the "beer story."

Sensing the work level and urgency of purpose now thrust upon the Hartford Coffee workers, the owners were packing beer when they showed up Thursday after the storm. Clarissa said the beer arrived at 11 AM but stressed it was only for workers of age. Coffee and beer—life itself.

The South City Diner lost power on that first Wednesday, and stayed dark until 4:30 PM Sunday, July 23. Lloyd, the manager I spoke with, said it got pretty interesting when the power went out with about 30 patrons in the restaurant. "At first, we used the manual credit card machine but when the paper ran out we started saying "the meal's on us," Lloyd explained. They were able to save the good stuff by bringing in ice

but the pastries and lesser items got pitched. On Sunday, Lloyd thought he saw a light in Mangia's, next door. When he finally saw the Diner's neon sign blazing he said, "YES!" and then called Peter, the owner. Ninety minutes later they were open for business. Lloyd said the customers were great and waited patiently as the servers checked their

inventory for each order. He added, "People were just glad to get anything."

As inconvenient as the power outage was, there was much good that came from it. When I went to remove limbs from our property on Humphrey, there were already

# Nowhere I'd Rather Be: Life in South St. Louis

Here in the middle of America, the most prosperous country on Earth, we are spoiled. Everyone has a computer available; if not at home, at the library. We have access to more food than we will ever be able to eat at convenient and well-lighted groceries, and, if we cannot afford to pay for it ourselves, there are government and private agencies for help. During the winter months we take heating for granted, and until two weeks ago we felt the same about air conditioning. One 45-minute storm and hundreds of thousands of St. Louisans had no air conditioning, no lights, and no cold food.

And it was a heat wave. Due to the heat, my son Cai and I slept downstairs in the living room the first night. Every half hour, all night, he found it necessary to inform me with his new verbal skills that the "ights" were "boten". My husband Ben was out until one a.m. with his hacksaw helping the neighborhood men clear the streets for cars and emergency vehicles. The next morning I joyously discovered that I would not have to work bleary-eyed, as my employer lacked electricity as well. Cai and I packed up our van, and drove out to my sister's in Beaufort. We basked in the glow of cousins and freon during that 105 degree day. The heat broke the next day, and we drove home sure that Ben would greet us at the door with smiles and cool air. Not that night, nor the night after, or the night after that.

Our food went bad. The National Guard was called in. My son was heartbroken that he couldn't watch *Shrek* or *Finding Nemo* ad nauseum. Our laptop only had two hours of power on it with no hope of a recharge, so no work got done. The air in our house was stagnant by Sunday morning, and tempers were rising with the inescapable temperatures. Cai and I decided to pack off to my father's place, where I was able to check e-mail

and plug in for some work.

When we got back that night there was still no juice, but there was an Ameren truck parked up the block repairing a downed pole. As Cai and I were stretched out on the hot, sticky sheets trying to sleep, I heard screaming coming through the open bedroom

windows. I leapt up to see if the tempers had finally broken through the civility that had been the rule since the power went out, and discovered the lights on up and down the street. Neighbors were hollering as they rushed in to shut the windows for the

# Free Candy, With Amanda and Julia

If you're one of the people who has stumbled into Hartford Coffee Company on a given Sunday after 7 PM.—likely after thinking to yourself, “Hey, I didn't know Hartford was open on Sunday night! This is so cool!!”—and been instantly embarrassed as a room full of attentive South Siders turned their eyes toward you, then you might already be aware of the live talk show, Free Candy.

Since February 2004, Free Candy has lured numerous St. Louis celebs into its intimate coffee shop venue: former St. Louis mayor Vince Schoemel, Delmar entrepreneur Joe

Edwards, beer baron Tom Schlafly, RFT founder Ray Hartmann, Debbie Baldwin of *Ladue News*, and even Quentin the miracle dog. Once guests are seated on a barstool on what appears to be a stage, hosts Amanda Doyle and Julia Smillie grill them with comic barbs. The crowd invariably laughs its butt off.

In fairness, there's a lot of straight questioning and discussing that goes on, and at the end of Free Candy audience members mill about feeling enlightened. There is that mood, anyway, of having been informed about something important. Perhaps, then, the giddiness of the experience has something to do with the actual free

candy piled at the center of each table. More likely, it's the natural result of having sat through a live, non-broadcast talk show that is designed exactly like a real talk show. It may feel like improv, but there's a real band playing songs between guests, real hosts with real questions, and after all, *real guests*.

One such guest was teenage juggler and body contortionist Book Kennison, remembered fondly by Amanda for his incredible physical stunts. “Three weeks later he was on Letterman,” she says. This, in her memory, rivals the time Vince Schoemel graced the house with a stirring rendition of “Danny Boy” to close his appearance. “He has a lovely singing voice,” she says, a tear sparkling in her eye.

“The purpose of Free Candy has been, from the start, to give attention to below-the-radar things in St. Louis,” says Amanda, stressing how much she prepares for each show. “We can't wing it *ever*,” she says. Her task, and that of her fellow host, is at some level quite serious.

That doesn't prevent Amanda from recognizing the show's quirkiness: “People have described it as being akin to ‘Prairie Home Companion,’ and then they always add some caveat, like, ‘but for the non-Geritol crowd’ or ‘but with the f-word.’” Someone just told me they thought of it as being like the talk show Kramer invented on *Seinfeld* when he found the set from the old Merv Griffin show in the trash and decided to use it.”

Lately NPR's Tom Weber has subbed for Julia, whose temporary departure for Ann Arbor, Michigan last fall left Free Candy in the lurch. Julia is now planning to move to Ann Arbor permanently, but she's going to return to St. Louis for each show.

first time in a week. I gave a whoop, shut my own windows, and ran around the house turning on all the lights. Cai popped up and declared the "ights fist," and immediately asked to watch *Nemo*.

Two weeks later, I look back with gratitude at those horrible five days. Our neighbors banded together to clear the streets, and held barbeques, sharing food that would have gone bad otherwise. We were lucky enough to have relatives nearby with power who were generous enough to take us in. The National Guard did not have to control looters, or rioters, as they did in New Orleans. They cleared streets and checked on residents door-to-door, delivering ice and MREs as needed. Our mayor stepped up to the challenge and ran extra trash trucks so that our neighborhoods would not smell of thousands of refrigerators worth of rotten food. As much as we complained about Ameren and its lack of trimming that contributed to the severity of the outage, they called in hundreds of teams from out of state, and everyone worked long hours to restore our power.

I have learned so much about how lucky we are here in St. Louis through this power outage. In Lebanon, every decade there are power struggles, bombings where whole sections of town are leveled. In parts of Africa some children have never seen electric lights, much less been able to watch movies over and over again whenever they want. In Iraq, where we guide the destiny of a country whether we agree with the action or not and where many of our countrymen and women are stationed, this weather is not a heat wave—it is just the regular weather.

Even during the worst of the weather we had access to the library, the grocery stores, and transportation both public and private. Those are all things many of us take for granted as we go about our lives. I hope that I can keep that in mind more as I make purchases, vote, and turn on the

# Namaste

The word Namaste is used at the end and sometimes the beginning of most yoga classes. "Nama" means bow, "as" means I, and "te" means you, translating literally to "bow me you" or "I bow to you." It represents the belief that there is Divine life in each of us.

This gesture is performed by placing the hands together (in prayer position) at the heart, closing the eyes, and bowing the head. It can also be done by placing the hands in between the eyebrows (the third eye), bowing the head, and then slowly lowering the hands down to the heart. Bringing the hands together at the heart increases the flow of Divine love. Bowing the head and closing the eyes encourages the mind to surrender to the Divine in the heart.

In the West, the word Namaste is usually spoken in conjunction with the gesture. In India, however, it is under-

stood that the gesture itself signifies Namaste, making it unnecessary to say the word.

Namaste can be performed to oneself as a meditation technique that

can take you deeper into the heart. When done with someone else, it is a beautiful greeting or quick meditation from the heart.

In addition, all who chose to join the Neighborhood Association during the event received a free car club.
